The Hub has significantly impacted, reaching over **479** children through childcare facilities and more than **10,493** individuals through street outreach programs.

With a strategic and structured approach, the Hub addresses key Social challenges, including Homelessness, Substance Abuse, Mental Health Concerns, Residential Care, Hostel Facilities, Aftercare Support, Outreach Initiatives, Women's Empowerment, and Reintegration of young individuals released from the criminal justice system.

The Chennai Hub is committed to accompanying and empowering children and young individuals, ensuring their care, protection, and holistic development in safe and nurturing environments. The Hub advocates for strong social and legal safeguards to prevent neglect, exploitation, and violations of rights, fostering spaces that uphold dignity, participation, and social justice.

Each visit is made monthly through pre-scheduled appointments. These visits are essential for monitoring, evaluation, and capacity-building. The key objectives of each visit include:

- Regular monitoring of performance metrics to assess progress and identify areas for improvement.
- Compilation of reports providing insights into node activities and outcomes, ensuring transparency and accountability.
- Develop and update formats as needed for documenting processes and data collection.
- Creation of process flowcharts to improve understanding and streamline project execution.
- Ensuring proper maintenance of all registers and documentation.
- Facilitating technical support, including potential interventions from a national technical team, to resolve operational challenges.
- Identifying emerging challenges within nodes and strategizing appropriate solutions.
- Conducting training sessions on report creation, including snippets and infographics, to enhance communication and outreach efforts.
- Ensuring compliance with Don Bosco's Standards of Care, promoting consistency and quality.
- Investing in continuous learning and skill enhancement of team members.

Collaboratively formulating clear action plans for the upcoming month, defining key tasks and objectives. After discussing and planning the above points with the Node Director and the Coordinator, a follow-up mail is sent to the nodes to provide a summary of the visit and to reinforce the discussed plans and actions.

Orientation on Homelink DIGI Tool & Release of Don Bosco Standards of Care Documents at YaR Commission Meet – INM Province

On 1st April 2024, Mrs. Jyothi Priya conducted an orientation session for all YaR Commission members of the INM Province to introduce the Homelink DIGI tool. The session provided valuable insights into how the tool can enhance data analysis, decisionmaking, report generation, and organizational visibility.


Following the orientation, the Don Bosco Standards of Care (Social Audit) documents were released by Rev. Fr. Don Bosco, Provincial, and Fr. Joe Prabu, Executive Director of DBYaR Forum, New Delhi.



Hostel Act Training at Jawadhi Hils

On 13th April 2024, a training session was conducted at Jawadhi Hills, focusing on the Hostel Act and the associated documentation procedures. The session aimed to enhance participants' understanding of the legal framework and strengthen their capacity for effective implementation.

Key discussions included the mandatory registers to be maintained, ensuring compliance with the relevant legal provisions, and the adoption of structured documentation systems. This training empowered hostel management with the necessary knowledge and guidance to uphold regulatory standards and improve documentation practices. Fr. Majella, the Director of the institute, shared his insights and experiences regarding the implementation of Hostel Act procedures.



Infographic Training

On 14th May 2024, Mrs. Jyothi Priya conducted an Infographic Training session for all Hub Coordinators representing the 8 Hubs. The training focused on leveraging Canva, an intuitive graphic design tool, to create visually compelling reports and presentations. Participants received in-depth guidance on:

- Utilizing Templates Effectively
- Enhancing Report Presentation
- Visual Representation of Data

This session aimed to equip coordinators with essential skills in visual storytelling, enabling them to present data-driven insights more effectively and enhance the overall visibility of their reports.





Homelink DIGI Training Program at Hub Level

From 4th – 6th July 2024, the Homelink DIGI-INM Province Training Program was held at Deebagam Hall, Don Bosco Province House, Chennai, with participation from 6 Nodes. The inauguration was honoured by Thiru. Mathiyalagan (DCPO, Chennai), Fr. Joseph Leo (Director, Surabhi), Fr. Joe Prabu (Executive Director, DBYaR, New Delhi), Fr. Andrews Stephen Raj (Hub Director), and Fr. Arokiasamy (YaR Coordinator). The dignitaries emphasized holistic, child-centric documentation to support fostering goals. They stressed professional documentation, regular follow-ups, and timely updates.



The DB YaR Form National Team and Hub Coordinators led sessions on Homelink DIGI's hierarchy, data security, AI integration, and real-time monitoring. Participants received hands-on training in child flow, foster care, adoption, and the DPDP Act (2023) compliance. The event featured Power BI dashboards, Mobile app features, and service documentation tools. Fr. Don Bosco Lorudusamy released the Mini Research on Aftercare and the Hub Annual Report 2023 - 2024. The program emphasized Node guidelines, half-yearly planning, and financial sustainability. Certificates were awarded to participants for their commitment to strengthening child welfare services.











Closing & Inaugural of the National YaR Campaign

On 31st August 2024, the National YaR Campaign concluded with a virtual closing ceremony, attended by YaR Centres, children, young adults, staff, and management. A key highlight was the unveiling of the new YaR theme poster, "Family is Where I Belong," emphasizing the vital role of family in a child's growth and well-being. The theme's importance was shared with participants, stressing family-based care, reintegration, and emotional support. The event reinforced a collective commitment to ensuring every child finds a safe and nurturing home.



National YaR Seminar at Kochi

The DB YaR Forum held its Annual Seminar on 3rd - 4th October 2024 at the Alpha PastoralCentre, Kochi, focusing on "Empowering Families and Communities Towards Caring for Children and Young at Risk." The event gathered child welfare experts, policymakers, and stakeholders to discuss family-based care for vulnerable youth, followed by addresses from Fr. Joe Prabu and Fr. Santiagu Thomas, and a keynote by Dr. M.P. Antony on community partnerships in child protection. A key highlight was the release of the survey report "Vulnerability to Empowerment: A 50-Year Impact Journey of Don Bosco Sneha Bhavan Institutions, Kochi." Expert sessions covered child-centric family empowerment, legal frameworks for alternative care, and challenges faced by vulnerable children. A panel discussion and the launch of the "Family is where I Belong" campaign emphasized family-based care. The second day focused on practical applications, with insights from Kerala's Legal cum Probation Officer Aneesha V L and UNICEF's Sony Kutty George, along with a presentation on the Homelink (DIGI) network. The seminar concluded with a valedictory address by Fr. Santiagu Thomas, a vote of thanks by Fr. Joe Prabu, and special awards presented by Fr. Rafael Bejarano Rivera. The event reaffirmed a strong commitment to family-based care and community empowerment for at-risk children.



Fr. Rafael visits to YaR Centres of INM Province

On 10th October 2024, Fr. Rafael Bejarano SDB, Coordinator of Social Works & Services, Youth Ministry Department, Rome, along with Fr. Joe Prabu SDB, Executive Director of DBYaR, New Delhi, visited three YaR Centres under the INM Province: Don Bosco Beatitudes (Vyasarpadi), Anbagam - Pope John's Garden, and Don Bosco Anbu Illam (Saranalayam & Bosco Illam). They toured Children's Homes, Day Care Centres, Vocational Training Centres, and the Old Age Home, commending the management and staff for their dedicated efforts in child welfare. Fr. Rafael reviewed all 23 registers as per the JJ Acts, ensuring accuracy and timely updates, and congratulated the team for their diligence. Certificates for the National YaR poster-making



competition were distributed to the children. In the evening, Mrs. Jyothi Priya, Chennai Hub Coordinator, presented Homelink DIGI, emphasizing its role in digital documentation and operational efficiency. Fr. Rafael praised the tool's potential and expressed interest in future collaboration.

Session on influence of Online and Social Media at Marialaya



On 19th October 2024, a Session on influence of Online and Social Media at Marialaya, Chennai, with 52 participants, including youth from eight intervention areas, Marialaya Girls Home, and eight women group in-charges. The session provided in-depth insights into digital safety, cyber threats, privacy protection, and ethical social media use, equipping

participants with strategies to combat cyberbullying, online grooming, and exploitation. Engaging discussions, case studies, and interactive Q&A sessions fostered critical thinking on digital footprints and cybersecurity measures. The session concluded with a call to action, promoting responsible online behaviour, peer awareness, and proactive digital literacy initiatives, empowering participants to navigate the digital world safely and responsibly.

Tamil Nadu Consultation Meeting - Reform India Project

On 26th October 2024, the Tamil Nadu Consultation Meeting was held at the Commissioner's Office, Avadi, bringing together CWC and JJB members from Chennai, government officials, professors, researchers, advocates, and civil society representatives. The consultation, attended by retired IAS officers, organizers, and the Commissioner, focused on the Reform India Project, discussing the treatment of custodial victims, children, and women by law enforcement. Participants actively engaged in structured discussions, providing insights and sharing best practices to enhance policing and victim



support mechanisms. Additionally, questionnaires were completed by 13 civil society representatives, capturing critical feedback on existing procedures. The meeting concluded with participants offering key suggestions to improve police protocols, promote child-friendly approaches, and strengthen safeguarding measures, reinforcing collaborative efforts towards an inclusive and effective justice system.

Training on Individual Care Plan (ICP) - Enhancing Child Care Institutions

On 8th November 2024, an orientation session on the Individual Care Plan (ICP) framework was conducted by Mrs. Jyothi Priya for eight staff members of Don Bosco Anbu Illam, Chennai. The training emphasized the purpose, benefits, and legal mandate of ICP under the Juvenile Justice Act,2015,



ensuring structured, child-centric care. Participants were introduced to the four critical components of ICP: Child's Background Information, Rehabilitation and Restoration Plan, Progress Assessment and Follow-up, and Final Review and Recommendations. Practical demonstrations and real-life case discussions enhanced their understanding, followed by an interactive Q&A

session to address challenges. The session reinforced the importance of individualized planning for each child's holistic development and effective rehabilitation.

Staff Capacity Building Program – Strengthening Professional Standards in Child Care Institutions

On 12thNovember 2024, a Staff Capacity Building Program was conducted at Don Bosco Anbu Illam (DBAI) for team members from Bosco Illam and Saranalayam, focusing on enhancing their understanding of institutional child care protocols and professional standards. The session was inaugurated by Fr. Andrews Stephen Raj, Director of DBAI, who emphasized the significance of continuous learning in ensuring quality care and professional integrity. Facilitated by Mrs. Jyothi Priya (Hub Coordinator,



Homelink), Ms. Priyanka (Program Manager), and Mr. David (Outreach Worker), the training covered procedural documentation, staffing patterns, child flow management, and compliance with the

Juvenile Justice (JJ) Act. Practical examples and best practices were shared to reinforce systematic documentation, accountability, and service efficiency. Staff actively engaged in discussions on field challenges, team collaboration, and safeguarding children's rights, committing to implementing their learnings in daily operations. The program concluded with recommendations for regular follow-ups and periodic training to address evolving challenges and maintain high professional standards in child care services.

Empowering Children Through Family Values and AI Awareness at Anbagam

On 23rd November 2024, a session on "Family is Where I Belong" and an introduction to AI tools was conducted at Anbagam, engaging 32 children and staff members. The session on "Family is



Where I Belong" emphasized the significance of family as a foundational support system, fostering emotional security, values, and a sense of belonging. Discussions focused on strengthening familial relationships, responsible communication, and creating a nurturing environment for holistic development. Additionally, the AI tools session introduced children to the basics of artificial intelligence, demonstrating its practical applications in daily life and its growing role in various fields. Interactive activities and hands-on demonstrations helped participants grasp key AI concepts, making the session both informative and engaging. The event successfully encouraged critical thinking, digital literacy, and a deeper understanding of family values among the participants.

Strengthening Child Protection and Reintegration: CSOs Meeting at Bosco Illam

On 13th December 2024, a Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) Meeting was held at Bosco Illam, bringing together representatives from 24 NGO's with 34 members actively participating. The meeting focused on key child welfare and protection themes, including family-based care, reintegration approaches, child safeguarding policies, and protection mechanisms. A significant



highlight of the event was the presentation on the Homelink DIGI tool, which showcased its functionalities and role in strengthening digital documentation and case management for vulnerable children. The session facilitated open discussions and collaborative engagement, encouraging participants to share insights, best practices, and challenges in implementing child-centric programs. This interactive platform reinforced networking and knowledge exchange among stakeholders, contributing to enhanced child protection strategies and service delivery within the sector.



National Director's Annual Visitation: Strengthening Collaboration and Digital Innovation at Chennai Hub

On the 3rd and 4th of January 2025, Fr. Joe Prabu National Director, conducted his annual visitation to the Chennai Hub, assessing the progress and effectiveness of ongoing programs. During his visit, he engaged in detailed discussions with representatives from Anbagam, DBAI Saranalayam, and ANAT Farm, focusing on the operational status, challenges, and future strategies to enhance impact. Additionally, he held consultative meetings with key stakeholders to strengthen collaborative efforts and ensure the sustainability of intervention programs. A significant part of his visit included a meeting with Aruwye NGO, where he actively promoted the Homelink DIGI tool, highlighting its potential in improving digital documentation, case tracking, and child protection interventions. The visit served as a platform for strategic planning, knowledge-sharing, and reinforcing commitments to the welfare and rehabilitation of vulnerable individuals.

Homelink National Conference at Trichy

The Homelink National Conference was successfully conducted from 20th to 23rd January 2025, in Trichy, serving as a pivotal platform for all 11 Province Directors and Coordinators to engage in in-depth discussions on child care, protection, and rehabilitation strategies. The conference aimed to enhance structured interventions for children in need by focusing on key aspects such as the Indicators of the After Care Programme, Individual Care Plan (ICP), and various Centre Types and Services. A comprehensive panel discussion featured the participation of the Director alongside industry experts, fostering insightful deliberations on project proposals, execution methodologies, and the integration of AI-driven solutions to streamline documentation, monitoring, and rehabilitation processes. This conference facilitated interdisciplinary collaboration, best practice sharing, and strategic planning, strengthening the collective efforts of child welfare organizations to ensure sustainable and effective support systems for vulnerable children.



INM YaR Day 2025

On 2nd February 2025, the Young At Risk Day - Chennai Province was celebrated at Don Bosco Beatitudes, Vyasarpadi, bringing together 296 participants from various child welfare organizations, including Don Bosco Anbu Illam (Chennai & Kavarapettai), Don Bosco Beatitudes (Vyasarpadi), Anbagam - Pope John's Garden, ANAT Farm, WeLive Foundation (Chennai), St. Thomas Orphanage, Marialaya (Chennai), and Pothur. The event, themed "Family is Where I Belong," underscored the importance of family unity, support, and a sense of belonging within communities. The inaugural ceremony, led by Fr. Joe Andrew, Fr. John Christopher, and Fr. Arokiyasamy, emphasized the need for dedication and wholehearted efforts in serving young individuals at risk. The event featured theme-based competitions, where Marialaya, Chennai, secured First Place, Don Bosco Anbu Illam (Boys Home) won Second Place, and Don Bosco Anbu Illam (Girls Home) earned Third Place, with Anbagam - Pope John's Garden being recognized for its discipline. The valedictory function, attended by Mr. Churchill (CWC Member) and Mr. Daniel (Protection Officer, DCPU Chennai), honoured both competition winners and top academic achievers from the 10th and 12th grades (2023-2024) at the province level. The celebration concluded with a fellowship meal, reinforcing the values of commitment, excellence, and inclusivity, fostering a stronger support system for atrisk youth.



Discussion on Integrating Homelink DIGI with the Department of Child Welfare and Services



On 26th February 2025, I attended a strategic meeting at the Directorate Office with Ms. Kasturi, Deputy Director of the Department of Child Welfare and Child Services, along with Fr. Joe Prabu, Fr. Andrews, and Mrs. Jyothi Priya. We demonstrated the Homelink DIGI tool, highlighting its features and potential benefits for documentation, tracking, and case management within the department. The discussion focused on how the tool could be integrated into existing systems to improve efficiency and streamline data management.

Ms. Kasturi responded positively and suggested a follow-up meeting with the Technical Team to analyze the compatibility between CPIMMS (Child Protection Information Management and Monitoring System) and Homelink DIGI.

The follow-up meeting took place on 19th March 2025 with Thiru. Johny Tom Varghese, IAS, Director of the Department of Child Welfare and Special Services, the Technical Team, and our National Team. We presented a comparison between CPIMMS and Homelink DIGI. The officials appreciated our tool and discussed how it could be integrated into the government's online platforms. The next steps will involve formal communication between both parties to proceed with implementation discussions.

Orientation on Staffing Patterns, Roles, and Responsibilities at Child Care Institutions

The orientation sessions on staffing patterns, roles, and responsibilities at Child Care Institutions (CCIs) held with the Homelink Network Partners of the INM Province was a pivotal professional engagement aimed at ensuring compliance with the Juvenile Justice Act,2015. Directors, staff members, and the stakeholders convened to gain a comprehensive understanding of the mandated staffing structures and individual responsibilities outlined in the JJ Act. Through detailed presentations and interactive discussions, participants were equipped with the knowledge and tools necessary to effectively fulfill their roles within CCIs. Emphasis was placed on the critical need for adherence to legal regulations to uphold the quality of care provided to children under the institution's guardianship. By fostering a culture of collaboration and continuous learning, this session served as a foundational step towards enhancing the professionalism and efficacy of childcare practices within the INM Province's Homelink Network.





Workshop on Aftercare





The WeLive Foundation conducted a workshop at MMDA, Chennai, focusing on the transition to aftercare for children and young adults leaving institutional care. The session brought together 27 participants from nine organizations, where the Homelink DIGI tool was demonstrated by Ms. Jyothi Priya as a digital solution for monitoring,

tracking, and reintegrating at-risk youth into society. Participants engaged in insightful discussions on leveraging technology to strengthen aftercare systems. This workshop marked a significant step toward empowering organizations with digital tools to better support vulnerable youth in their journey toward independent living, reinforcing a collaborative approach to child welfare through technology-driven solutions and community partnerships.

A meticulous review of mandatory registers revealed a commendable standard of maintenance, reflecting the team's dedication to upholding organizational protocols. This proactive approach ensures the integrity of our documentation and reinforces a culture of excellence within the organization.





V. Manizlavier. Welcomed with warmth, she quickly embraced the nurturing environment and developed a passion for athletics, particularly running. Her dream of becoming a runner took shape when the Rishi Foundation visited Anbagam, where she was trained in running techniques, discipline, and goal-setting. With the encouragement of Fr. Dominic, Br. Kulandai Yesu, and the Rishi Foundation, she set her sights on competing in a marathon.
